# Save-A-Life Initiative

Introduced last year, the Save-A-Life initiative strives to increase the survival rate of cardiac arrest victims by building a network of trained Community First Responders who are able to promptly respond and administer CPR-AED in their immediate vicinity.

Other than stepping up efforts to increase the availability of AEDs in public spaces and frequencies of CPR-AED training sessions, Community First Responders can also leverage the SCDF's *myResponder* mobile application to respond to emergency cases and render their assistance before the arrival of SCDF.

Since the launch of the *myResponder* mobile application last year, the SCDF has seen a steady growth of success cases where Community First Responders volunteered their assistance.

# Mass Decontamination Vehicle



As the classic Chinese saying goes, one has got to climb to a greater height in order to enjoy a grander sight. Building on our previous successes, the Mass Decontamination Vehicle (MDV) is an evolution of the existing Personnel Decontamination Vehicle. The latter was designed for use in incidents that involve Hazardous Materials (HazMat) and to carry out the mass decontamination of people. It has also two other functions - casualty conveyance (up to 12 casualties) and transportation of personnel and equipment, which gives it the flexibility of being deployed to support major operations other than a HazMat incident.

The newly introduced MDV is expected to be operational by June 2017.

Through the adaptation of design intuitiveness with advanced technology, the MDV will also allow for a faster and higher capacity decontamination of casualties who are exposed to HazMat.

# Fire and Rescue Operations Support Tender

The Fire and Rescue Operations Support Tender (FROST) is an innovative solution which functionally integrates two of SCDF's primary frontline support vehicles, namely the Breathing Apparatus Tender and the Damage Control Tender. Other than the holistic suite of support functions and equipment, the top of the vehicle can also be used as additional storage space.

The FROST is expected to be operational by June 2016.

A few years ago, SSG Gangadevi underwent training to become a HazMat specialist and she is now trained to also mitigate incidents that involve chemical agents. SSG Gangadevi is a firm believer of life-long learning so as to keep up with the global trends and changes.

Her husband also shares the same mission as a fellow lifesaver.

Today, this function has been replaced by e-services.

When serving as the NCDCC Commandant, she experienced a change in her work environment. LTC Betty was no longer working with emergency responders or NSmen.

Instead, she worked with school teachers, parents as well as young adults who have chosen NCDCC as their Core-Curricular Activity.

Always attentive to details, LTC Betty saw the need to approach her new job scope differently. She wanted to nurture the NCDCC cadets to become responsible citizens, young ambassadors who can teach lifesaving skills, and most importantly, as Community First Responders. As much as she wanted to empower the cadets with these 'adult responsibilities', she was careful not to take the 'fun' element away from their learning journeys.

As part of her course and her employment with the SCDF, CPL Gwen has had the opportunity to serve her internship at the Central Fire Station and Ang Mo Kio Fire Station. As an intern, CPL Gwen responded to emergency calls together with the rest of the ambulance crew.

The one year internship was a valuable experience as it gave her the opportunity to learn from experienced paramedics and at the same time, be exposed to real life emergencies. It made her learning journey an adventure and most importantly, a realistic one.

To CPL Gwen, there is nothing more meaningful than being able to make a difference in someone's

For these reasons, she also took up part-time jobs as a private nurse and veterinary nurse during her school holidays. When she was working as a veterinary nurse, she assisted vets in the treatment of domestic animals such as dogs, cats, chinchillas and even hamsters.

CPL Gwen maintains her flawless complexion by using a gel moisturiser as her t-zone areas can get oily especially after attending to an emergency incident under the hot sun. Emergencies can take on different forms and every situation is unique. As such, SCDF paramedics are trained to be discerning and to see beyond what is presented on the surface.

As MAJ Joanne stood at the saluting dais with a bird's eye view of the lifesavers that she had worked with, her heart twitched a little.

When asked if the working environment of a uniform organisation was too 'manly' and 'rough' for her, MAJ Joanne described it instead as a "fulfilling and memorable" career and that the SCDF consists of a myriad of opportunities other than just operations.

After completing her CFS posting, MAJ Joanne went on to further her studies at the Portland State University in Portland, Oregon.

While pursuing her Master of Public Administration, she met with public servants, who were also her fellow classmates, from around the world and with the most interesting perspectives to offer. Currently, SWO Rahah is very focused on cultivating *A Nation of Lifesavers* in Singapore and she does her part by enhancing and promoting the SCDF

Community Emergency Preparedness Programme (CEPP). This modular-based programme provides both theory and practical training on Basic First-Aid, CPR and the use of AED. SWO Rahah is always on the lookout for ways to review and improve the curriculum of the CEPP programme as she wants to "perfect it by keeping it relevant".

Instead of being greeted by a delectable cake, lighted candles and the warmth of her loved ones, she witnessed the deployment of 40 appliances and the dangerous and perilous conditions that the SCDF personnel were working under.

Together with her team of officers from the SCDF Logistics Department, they quickly assessed the needs and requirements of the emergency responders. AC Lai Fong made it her priority to ensure that the welfare of the emergency responders were well taken care off specifically during the firefighting operation. Before they knew it, these emergency responders were issued with blankets and dry clothes for the overnight operations.

Having spent so many years of her life with the SCDF, AC Lai Fong has witnessed the different facets of the organisation. When she first joined the SCDF, AC Lai Fong was designated as a Staff Officer with the Manpower Department for one year before being appointed as the Personal Staff Officer to former Commissioner James Tan. Subsequently, she was posted to other departments including the Strategic Planning Department and National Service Personnel Department before taking on the role as the Director of Logistics Department.

AC Lai Fong joined the organisation because she was convinced by its lifesaving mission portrayed by the rescuers during the collapse of the Lian Yak Building, more commonly known as the Hotel New World. She also counts herself lucky for being able to qualify for the first intake of female officers in SCDF, exactly three decades ago.

As a woman of few words, AC Lai Fong had never expected herself to be the first female in the SCDF to be promoted to a rank of a Assistant Commissioner. Instead, she is more than appreciative of the learning opportunities that she has had throughout her career with the SCDF.

AC Lai Fong may have missed the opportunity to celebrate her birthday with her family in 2011 but her family has always been very supportive of her career as a lifesaver.

In fact, it takes an individual with a heart to do this job well" said LTA Amy. The same principles apply to her current posting as a Personnel Officer with the SCDF Marine Command.

LTA Amy witnessed the first batch of Operationally Ready National Servicemen (ORNSmen) reporting for the inaugural Marine In-Camp Training last year. She made sure that she took care of the needs of the ORNSmen by answering to their queries promptly so as to ensure that it would not be an administrative nightmare for them since it was also their maiden experience.
